Have a child describe what is happening in the picture.

Call on a child to come to the front to put a few pieces in a puzzle. Choose another child to practice giving the compliment. Coach the children through the scenario by labeling each step. After the child has given the compliment (you may also choose to remind the other to say "thank you") have the group reinforce their behavior by clapping, saying "hooray!" etc.
