
Tapping a Friend on the Shoulder

Have a child describe what is happening in the picture.

That's right, this boy is gently tapping his friend on the shoulder to get her attention. First he taps her shoulder then he says "do you want to play with me?" Who would like to try asking a friend to play blocks by gently tapping him/her on the shoulder to get his/her attention?

Call on a child to act out this scenario by asking a friend (perhaps a child with a disability) to play blocks with him/her set up in front of the group. Coach the children through the scenario by labeling each step. After the children have stacked 2 or 3 blocks together give a group compliment by having everyone clap, give a thumbs up, etc.

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Asking, "Do You Want to Play with Me?"

Have a child describe what is happening in the picture.

Call on a child to act out this scenario by asking a friend (perhaps a child with a disability) to play blocks with him/her set up in front of the group. Coach the children through the scenario by labeling each step. After the children have stacked 2 or 3 blocks together give a group compliment by having everyone clap, give a thumbs up, etc.
